Committed to the Greater Good of the Public Realm and the Profession

As a leader, Trey Wheeler's advocacy efforts are characterized by active listening and respect for others. His inclusive and intentional approach has protected the profession and the communities he serves. He skillfully facilitates discussions, connects great thinkers, includes underrepresented parties, and consistently advocates for the good of the public realm.

Trey's practice and built work are consistent with his value for humanity and commitment to the best interests of the public. While designing the Ocoee Olympic Venue, Trey honored both the Cherokee Nation and the Pityopsis Ruthii species defending their home and habitat. Trey's design choices for the Cummins Falls State Park Visitor Center protected the environment and led him to create potentially life-saving design solutions enabling rangers to adequately protect visitors. As part of the Westside Evolves Master Plan, he amplified the public voice and included the community in the decision-making process to ensure their involvement in the revitalization of their neighborhood. The entirety of Trey's work continuously illustrates his commitment to the benefit of society and the equitable involvement of all parties.

Steadfast Advocacy and Impact on Public Policy

Trey's commitment to the greater good and persistence in advocacy has impacted nearly every aspect of his involvement with public policy.
